HOUSES AT PARLIAMENT

In preparation for Homelessness Week (4-10 August 2025), dozens of Victoria's leading community organisations are coming together to raise awareness about the urgent need for more social and public housing in Victoria.

This year the focus is on awareness raising in our local communities: encouraging displays within schools, libraries, local business, local government, housing services and peoples homes.

We need your help to fold 60,000 origami houses, representing the 60,000 additional social homes needed to meet current need in Victoria, and display them for Homelessness Week (4-10 August 2025).

Help us raise awareness and ensure there are enough appropriate houses for everyone in our community to live in, so together we can prevent people from becoming homeless.

In this pack, you will find all the information you need to get your classroom involved in the challenge. We're excited to see what you come up with!

About

HOUSES AT PARLIAMENT

The Houses at Parliament **project** was launched in 2023. At the first and second events, participants were joined by Members of Parliament and advocates with lived experience of homelessness, as 6,000 origami homes were placed on the steps of Victoria's Parliament House.

This year we're focusing on local communities and encouraging displays within schools, libraries, local business, housing services and everyday homes. We hope to fold 60,000 houses across Victoria, to represent the number of homes needed.

We are asking that State and Federal Governments commit to:

- Building at least 60,000 additional, appropriate social homes to meet current need in Victoria;
 and
- Implementing the 10 year National Housing and Homelessness Plan, with a commitment to end homelessness.



About the organiser

Houses At Parliament is run by the Victorian Homelessness Network (VHN). VHN is a partnership of the nine Regional Homelessness Networks in Victoria, which are funded by Victoria's Department of Families, Fairness and Housing, to share information and identify common needs and gaps in homelessness service provision.

The VHN acknowledges CISVic as the original creators of this origami house concept and thank them for their generosity and willingness to share their campaign creations with us.

Housing and Homelessness

Housing is necessary for a person's overall wellbeing. Feeling safe, warm, and rested gives people a chance to participate fully in society.

Homelessness can lead to poor physical and mental health because of the difficulties accessing and storing nutritious food, constant concerns about shelter and safety, and lack of access to medical treatment due to financial hardship or travel.

Homelessness also impacts people's rights to safety and privacy because they might not have a space where they can live and store their belongings without fear of harm. This is also true of accommodations, such as rooming houses, where shared facilities may leave people feeling unsafe.

Finally, homelessness can be a barrier to employment due to discrimination, and difficulty managing immediate survival needs alongside participating in the workforce.

What is homelessness?

Homelessness means that a person doesn't have a stable or safe place to live.

You may have seen people sleeping on the streets. This can be very distressing to see for many people. But homelessness is not just about sleeping on the streets ('sleeping rough').

Homelessness can include:



Sleeping outside e.g. under a bridge or on the street



Couch surfing (staying a night or two at another person's house, often on the couch or spare bed)



Living or sleeping in a car



Staying in a housing shelter, hostel or refuge



Living in an abandoned house or building



Staying in overcrowded housing



Living in temporary accommodation

Homelessness can affect anyone

There are a number of reasons why people can become homeless. These can include:

- · Not enough affordable housing
- · Rising cost of living
- Centrelink payments too low
- · Low wages
- · Insecure employment
- · Family troubles
- · Violence and abuse
- Mental and physical health issues
- · Drug and alcohol use

What are the impacts of being homeless?

Even if a person becomes homeless for just a short period of time, the impacts can last a long time.

It may be harder for people to:

- Find a job
- · Stay connected with family, friends, and others
- · Look after their physical and mental health
- · Stay at School

It can also affect how a person feels about themselves, their schooling, ability to cope with everyday stresses, and alcohol and drug use.

Homelessness in Victoria

Over the next couple of months Homelessness organisations are highlighting the number of people without safe and stable houses in Victoria. They're calling for more housing to be built to help end homelessness. They need your help to fold 60,000 origami houses for a big display to get the attention of people in Government.



This activity involves you making and decorating an origami house.

Remember to pause so you can follow the visual instructions (be careful of the tricky part at the 2.10-minute mark of the video!).

We would like to collect as many of your origami houses as possible to display in the classroom (an/or the school library, hall or foyer).

Have fun and remember to take a photo of your houses to share with other participants in the House at Parliament Project.


Materials needed:

- A square piece of paper. Suggestion: you can trim an A4 piece of paper into a square (here's <u>a video</u> about how to turn an A4 sheet into a square)
- Scissors
- Anything to decorate with pencils, textas, oil pastels, stickers etc.







How to build an origami house


1. Create crease in centre of square paper.




2. Fold edges toward centre crease.



3. Create crease in centre.




4. Turn over. Fold edges toward crease.



5. Open top corners and flatten.



6. Flip over. Decorate & write a message!
